January 19, 2024 **Paws Corner** by Sam Mazzotta DEAR PAW'S CORNER: I am traveling for busi-

ness in a few days and will be gone for just over a week. Because I can't bring my dog Jasper with me, I'm trying to decide whether to board him at a nearby kennel or hire a dog-sitter. I'm worried about that respiratory illness that has been affecting dogs lately. – Todd G., via email DEAR TODD: Both of those options are fine.

Schedule a tour of the kennel facility so you can see the conditions Jasper will live in and talk to the staff. Has the kennel had any dogs develop kennel cough or other viruses recently? How often do they disinfect the kennels and play areas? How much exercise do the dogs get?

Likewise, interview the dog-sitter in person. How often will they visit Jasper. How often will Jasper get walks and play time? Will Jasper be the only dog being walked, or with a group? Is the dog-sitter insured, in case of accidents?

Once you've decided be sure they have your contact information, and details about Jasper's diet and medications. Place an article of clothing that has your scent on it in Jasper's bag so he is more comfortable.

After you return, keep an eye on Jasper to make sure he's healthy. If he is coughing or sneezing frequently, has a lot of nasal or eye discharge, and seems lethargic or uninterested in food, take him to the vet for an evaluation. ©2024 King Features Synd., Inc.

### By COL (Ret.) Grey D. Berrier II The Fascination, Fun, Friendship, and Foibles of Flintlocks (Part 1 of 2)

ruffed grouse is

our official PA state bird and mountain laurel is our state flower. But you may not be aware the Pennsylvania long rifle (a.k.a. the flintlock rifle) was adopted as our state firearm in June 2014. The reason behind this designation is a longrunning "feud" between Pennsylvania and Kentucky over the history of the flintlock rifle. Based on books and movies, individuals started calling flintlock rifles, "Kentucky rifles,' because it was the firearm of choice when the vast wilderness of Kentucky was first explored in 1769 and eventually settled.

However, the part that history frequently overlooks is Daniel Boone was originally from Pennsylvania and the flintlock rifles he, his fellow explorers, and the early settlers carried were mostly handmade by master gunsmiths, primarily German immigrants, here in PA. That is why we honor this unique piece of PA lore by having the sole flintlock-only deer hunting season in the United Sates each year after Christmas and extending into the new year. Our recent season ran from Dec. 26, 2023 to Jan. 15, 2024.

Now, other states have muzzleloading seasons where hunters can use flintlocks, percussion caps (which replaced flintlocks around 1830), and modern inline muzzleloaders (which is also the case in PA's early antlerless only muzzleloading season every October) and some, such as Kentucky, have "primitive seasons" where hunters can use either flintlocks or percussion cap firearms, but we can proudly say we are the only ones who designate a time to remember our past and pursue deer with our earliest colonists' technology. Now, you may be thinking, what's so special and alluring about flintlock deer hunting?

Well, for one there is a tremendous learning curve required to make a flintlock rifle reliably ignite in all weather conditions. Then, there is the practice necessary to condition your shooting eye and brain to keep your iron sights (no modern scopes permitted!) on target when there is a visible "flash in the pan" as your cock's flint strikes the steel frizzen showering your very fine priming powder with sparks and a miniscule delay before the main propelling charge ignites in the barrel and your patched lead roundball is sent down range at your target. Finally, there is the trecestors, those rugged individuals who Outdoors! settled Pennsylvania and the other colo-



berry ink by the light of a home-dipped candle. To become proficient writing by early colonial means requires patience, a significant learning curve, and a major time commitment, but the outcome would be rather unique (not many people can do it) and very satisfying. It's the same when it comes to properly and safely loading, shooting, cleaning, and hunting deer with a flintlock rifle today.

I personally find shooting and hunting with my flintlock rifle fascinating and fun. As long as I've been making my flintlock rifle function properly, I still find I'm always learning something new about loading, shooting, or cleaning through personal experience, talking to other flintlock enthusiasts, reading, or watching YouTube videos. If you are an experienced flintlock hunter, just getting started, considering trying it out, or simply curious about the entire process, you may want to go to the Weekly Bargain Bulletin's website and consult the past editions available there, specifically those from Dec. 23, 2022, Jan. 6, 2023, and Jan 13, 2023; where I did a three-part series on the "nuts & bolts' of shooting a flintlock, along with sharing some of the best tips and tactics I've learned over the years. (Note: a WBB edition was not published on Dec. 30, 2022 over the holidays.) I can say our late flintlock season after Christmas has become my favorite time and means to hunt deer. The woods are mostly empty of other hunters, there might be snow to improve visibility and tracking, the deer may be getting back into more of a patterned routine several weeks after the regular firearms season, and the friendship with fellow flintlock hunters is even more treasured in spite of the cold and the potential foibles inherently present. 
